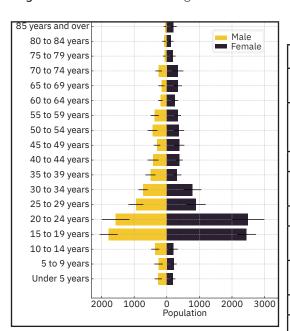

# **About West Chester**

The Borough of West Chester, established in 1799 as the county seat of Chester County, has historically been an important regional center. Recognized by the National Trust for Historic Preservation as a Distinctive Destination in 2006, the 1.8 square mile area features historic neighborhoods, a lively Downtown with shops and dining, and a mix of public, private, and nonprofit employers. The local economy thrives on educational, governmental, and professional sectors, significantly boosted by West Chester University. Cultural life includes university programs, galleries, and performance venues. The Borough is also noted for its environmental sustainability including projects for initiatives, promoting sustainable practices and community engagement in eco-friendly activities.

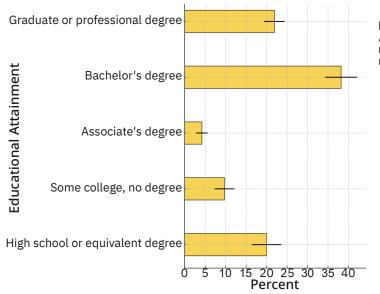
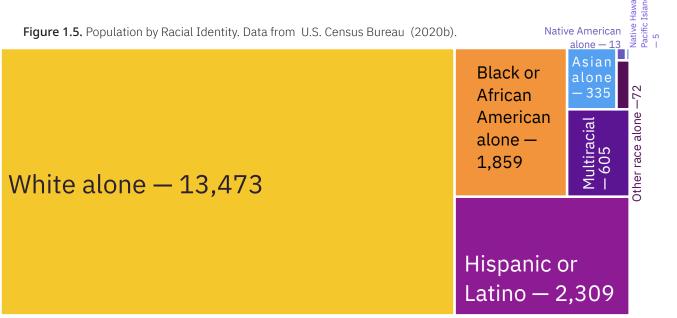


Figure 1.4. (Left) Educational Attainment in West Chester (U.S. Census Bureau & U.S. Department of Commerce, 2023b)

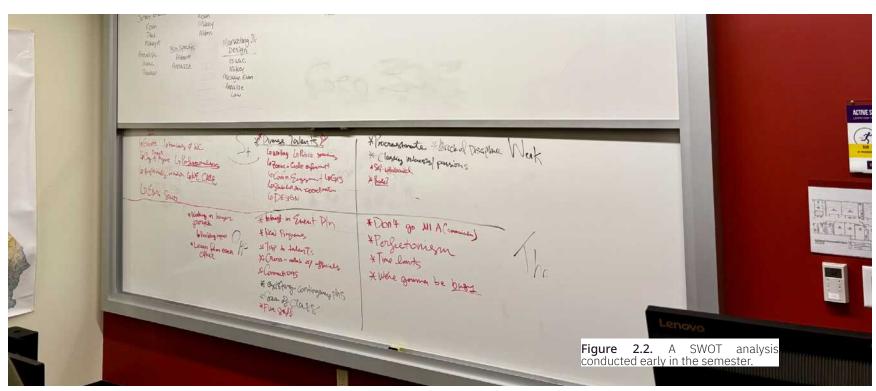

### **Challenges and Opportunities**

Hosting an event in West Chester poses challenges, but also presents a variety of opportunities. One key challenge is acquiring the proper permits and insurance from applicants, vendors, and subcontractors. Permit applications can be complicated, with strict requirements and restrictions. Event holders must also be aware of who owns the roads on which

the event will be held for any necessary road closures. This is especially important for events hosted on Gay Street and Market Street, as the event planners must have approval to shut down sections of the street before the event is held. Funding can also be a challenge, as event costs can quickly add up, requiring securing grants and stakeholders, which may also be difficult. With greater scale comes a greater need for amenities and security, which are non-negotiable. Another concern is site constraints, as the event

planners must think about the venue's ability to accommodate the anticipated number of attendees and their parked vehicles, as well as rerouting traffic around the venue for non-attendees. It's vital to ensure there are enough waste disposal stations and bathrooms, and that the space can handle larger crowds if necessary. Public safety is another aspect that may present challenges, as the venue must allow easy Police, Fire and EMT access in an emergency.

On the other hand, hosting an event in West Chester can present several opportunities. West Chester's location Southeast Pennsylvania allows for relatively easy access via highway from much of Chester County. Delaware County, Montgomery County, Philadelphia, and northern Delaware can also access the Borough within an hour's drive. The vibrant downtown that West Chester prides itself on allowing events

to be very enjoyable for the public and provide an economic boost to local businesses. West Chester University, also within the Borough, provides a potential target demographic of young adults with time to spare and interests to partake in. Events that can engage with local businesses and cultural groups serve to strengthen and showcase the area's unique communities and amenities. Incorporating sustainability into the fabric of an event, with goals to reduce water usage, waste, and emissions,

or including a charity component to an event's structure can boost local morale, increase awareness of the cause, and inspire positive change.

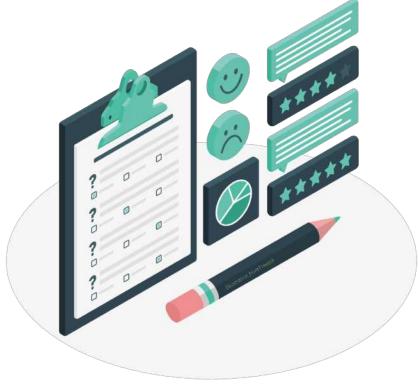

### **West Chester Community Survey**

The Community Engagement Team compiled a brief 12 question anonymous survey to better understand interest and feedback on existing events held in West Chester, and a potential future event coming to the Borough. Any adult visiting or living in West Chester was encouraged to share their thoughts by spending a few minutes answering logistical and demographic questions. This survey was hosted on Google Forms. The Studio Team distributed the survey over the course of a week in late October, 2024 via QR code. No personally identifying information was collected at any point in this process. Respondents were found primarily by asking passersby on West Chester University campus and throughout the Borough, by sharing the survey digitally with students, and by prominently displaying the QR code at the University's Urban Planning Day event tabling. The survey responses may be decently representative of undergraduate students at the University, but not of Borough residents or those visiting the Borough.

The team inquired about respondents' experience with existing events: what respondents liked and disliked about

these events, what about past events in West Chester could be improved, where respondents would be more likely to attend an event in West Chester, what transportation mode respondents would use to arrive at an event in West Chester,

what type of event respondents would be more likely to attend, and whether respondents felt safe at events in West Chester.

The team followed these event-related questions with demographic questions: approximate age, gender, race and/or ethnicity, if the respondent was a student of West Chester University, and if the respondent lives in West Chester.

### **RESULTS**

### **Demographics**

Considering this survey was conducted primarily on West Chester University campus, the demographic profile of the survey reveals that most respondents were undergraduate students (72.1%), aged 18-24 (75.6%), and white (73.3%). This younger, college-aged crowd make up a large fraction of the Borough's population, and are a notable audience willing and able to attend events held in the area.

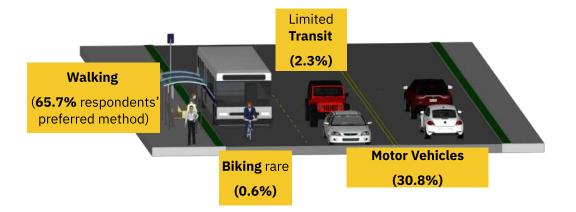


Figure 3.3. Modes of Transportation

### **Mode of Transportation**

Per the surveyed respondents, the most common mode of transportation used to attend events in West Chester is walking. with 65.7% of respondents choosing this as their preferred method. This suggests that many attendees live within walking distance of event venues. Cars are the second most common method of transportation at 30.8%, indicating that a considerable amount of people in and around West Chester rely on personal vehicles. Public transportation and biking are much less common, accounting for only 2.3% and 0.6% of responses, respectively. This may point to a limited amount of reliable public transport or bike-friendly infrastructure within West Chester, which could be an area for improvement.

### **Event Satisfaction**

Most respondents (81.4%) reported that they had never disliked an event held in West Chester. However, 18.6% said to have had negative experiences, citing reasons such as poor organization, lack of excitement, accessibility issues, and inadequate parking. These criticisms highlight areas to be improved, including better coordination, more engaging programming, and enhanced accessibility.

### **Areas for Improvement**

When identifying aspects of West Chester events that can be improved, respondents were asked to select all that apply or write in their own answer. Respondents overwhelmingly identified parking (55.8%) and traffic (39%) as the top concerns within this multiple-choice question. This could be remedied by notifying the public about road closures. Additionally, overcrowding (36%) and issues with advertising/marketing (30.2%) were also mentioned, pointing to better crowd management and more effective promotion of events as areas to be improved.

### **Takeaways**

Overall, survey respondents have a favorable view of events in West Chester, with most participants expressing that they feel both safe and enthusiastic about attending. Respondents showed a preference for music and culinary events held within the walkable core of the Borough. The most pressing issues with West Chester events, based on respondents' feedback, are crowd and traffic management, as well as parking. Increasing the variety, cost profile, and accessibility of events could help expand the reach and appeal of these community gatherings.

In future research, a second round of survey distribution focused on Borough residents and frequent visitors unaffiliated with the University would complement this survey well, providing a window into demographics and attitudes underrepresented here.

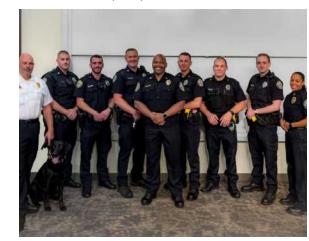

### **Regulatory Framework**

### **KEY ORDINANCE SECTIONS**

The following ordinances govern special events in West Chester Borough:

### § 36-5 Alcoholic Beverages - Exemptions

Allows alcohol service within business confines, including outdoor seating areas with table service. This applies specifically to establishments licensed by the State Liquor Control Board, and patrons must remain within defined business boundaries.<sup>1</sup>



### § 73-4 Noise Disturbances - Exemptions

Establishes quiet hours between 11pm-10am, with specific provisions for large gatherings and special events.

### § 77-7 Parking Program, Residential - Special Permit

Enables businesses holding large events to obtain special parking permits to accommodate increased vehicle traffic.

§ 78-1 Parks and Playgrounds - Establishment of Rules and Regulations

Requires permits for:

- Gatherings of over 25 persons
- Construction of any booth, table, stand, or tent
- Additional regulations apply to specific activities within park boundaries.



Any facility or establishment licensed to serve or to dispense alcoholic beverages by the State Liquor Control Board or other body pursuant to the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and persons who are patrons of any such facilities or establishments are exempt from this chapter, provided that the patrons remain within the confines of said facilities or establishments with the alcoholic beverages. The confines of said facilities or establishments shall include the sidewalk area between the public way and the front of said facility or establishment, so long as the facility and establishment provide adequate amounts of tables and seating for its patrons and provide waiter/waitress service to its patrons at said tables and seating facilities.

### § 80-22 Street Performing

Establishes operating hours for street performances:

- Sunday-Thursday: 9am-9pm
- Friday-Saturday: 9am-11pm

This includes 100ft restriction from schools and libraries.

### § 91 Shows, Carnivals, and Parade

Permits required for any large gathering. Section 91-2 details specific licensing requirements.2

<sup>2</sup>No carnival, circus, traveling show, music festival or parade shall be opened or operated in the borough unless and until a license has been issued for the same in accordance with this chapter.

### ROLE OF CHESTER COUNTY AND LARGER GOVERNMENT

### **Road Closure**

SEPTA and the Transportation Management Authority of Chester County must be notified of any road closure on the following streets:

- · Church Street
- Gay Street
- · Chestnut Street
- Sharpless Street
- High Street
- New Street
- Market Street
- Marshall Street

See Appendix A-D for maps of these streets.



### **Foodservice**

Event hosts must provide a list of all food vendors requiring a Chester County Health Department License or a temporary event license. Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board Permit is required if alcohol is present. Vendors also need insurance certifications naming Borough of West Chester as additional insured.



This section describe the permitting process for large gatherings in West Chester Borough within the ordinances framework, not the larger scope of deciding what kind of event to host. The permitting process is defined in § 91 of the West Chester Borough Ordinance.

### Important considerations:

- road ownership (state, county, municipal) for closure procedures; and
- potential impacts on regional bus transit.

The Borough, in this form, is looking for a detailed and accurate description of the event, the person(s) holding and responsible for the event, and the event's scope in order to mitigate public risks and nuisances.

The form below must be submitted to Council 60 days before the event, in detail.

### Requirements include:

- Insurance coverage for applicants, vendors, and subcontractors
- Notification to Good Fellowship Ambulance & EMS
- Payment for police and municipal services (hourly rates determined by Borough)

### Steps:

- 1. List applicant and event host information.
- 2. Provide thorough event details (type of event, day, start and end times, location, possible street closures, approximate noise levels)
- 3. List contact information for any vendors working the event. For food vendors, include:
  - Licensing information
  - Insurance documentation
- 4. List all third parties or subcontractors working the event.

- 5. Accommodate all municipal services needed to host an event:
  - Police presence
  - Traffic control

We evaluated each potential event location using an Alternatives Comparison Matrix, wherein each alternative (site) is assessed for its ability to meet the study's established objectives. For each metric, sites are scored on a green-to-red, traffic light spectrum:

- Green = Good
- Yellow = Fair
- Red = Poor

This scoring system was adapted from the AARP Sidewalk Audit methodology.

### **METRICS FOR SITE EVALUATION**

All four potential event sites were evaluated based on the following categories: transportation, public safety, and land use planning. A series of metrics were considered based on the objectives of this study, listed below.

### **Summary of Site Opportunities & Constraints**

### **GAY STREET**

As one of West Chester's most iconic streets, Gay Street offers a central location for events despite logistical challenges. Event organizers must close Gay Street to hold any events, requiring trucks or other large barriers at multiple locations, depending on the area used. The sidewalks along the road are in decent condition, but may pose challenges for disabled attendees as sections are uneven and may not meet ADA regulations.

Gay Street's location offers several advantages: multiple entry and exit points via Darlington and High Streets, fluid pedestrian movement, and reliable emergency service access even when closed. Organizers will need to re-route traffic during closures. The area provides sufficient parking and vehicle accessibility, with on-site vehicle parking, bicycle parking, and transit stops nearby. For safety considerations, the road receives ample sunlight during the day and sufficient streetlight coverage at night, though securing rooftops and managing crowd congestion remain major concerns.

Event planners must ensure resident access to apartments and homes on site while adhering to noise ordinances. Success requires coordination with PennDOT and Borough Parking Services for traffic and parking management, as well as SEPTA regarding impacts to bus route 104.

### MARKET STREET

Market Street's location provides extensive parking options through multiple nearby garages (Justice Center, Bicentennial, and Chestnut Street) and surrounding street parking. West Chester University's North Campus facilities, including Sharpless and Commons Garages, offer additional parking capacity. As the Borough's principal eastbound arterial, Market Street's well-maintained, wide pavement easily accommodates foot traffic and persons with mobility issues. Brick pavers form the sidewalks and maintain a relatively flat surface, though considerable narrowing at tree pits may challenge ADA compliance and event-goer mobility.

Event hosting requires Market Street's closure. As a principal arterial, this demands coordination with PennDOT, West Chester Borough Public Works, and SEPTA regarding bus routes 92, 104, and 135.

The street's numerous access points benefit both event-goers and emergency vehicles. High and New Streets mark the boundaries, while Church and Darlington Streets cross through. Three alleyways (Wilmont Mews, Courthouse Alley, and Woodbine Alley) and the Justice Center Parking Garage provide additional access. Natural light floods the area during daytime hours, with lamp posts ensuring visibility at night. Despite tree-lined streets, shade remains minimal due to Market Street's width, creating potential heat management challenges during warmer months.

Residential presence along Market Street raises noise exposure concerns. Additionally, the street's importance as a thoroughfare may generate community resistance to closure-requiring events.

### WEST CHESTER UNIVERSITY ACADEMIC QUAD

The West Chester University Academic Quad stands out as the most accessible venue, featuring extensive parking and established transportation infrastructure. Multiple nearby parking garages complement surface lots and street parking options. Recently improved sidewalks and crosswalks provide the Borough's best ADA accessibility. Its proximity to High Street offers visibility without requiring street closure, minimizing impact on SEPTA operations.

While the Quad offers numerous pedestrian entry points, most wheelchair-accessible, it provides only one vehicle entrance. Wheelchair users should note the distance from accessible parking and the Quad's hilltop location. Emergency Services face access limitations, with one official entrance and one vehicle-capable pedestrian path. Benefits include a nearby Fire House, abundant natural light, and well-lit pathways. North-side tree cover provides excellent daytime shade but creates darker nighttime conditions. University ownership of surrounding buildings enables effective event security. Planners should address potential crowding at the High and Rosedale pedestrian crossing.

The Quad's 800-foot buffer from the nearest residential unit minimizes noise complaint risks. Event planning requires University permission and coordination.

### **EVERHART PARK**

Everhart Park, despite its green space appeal, presents significant logistical challenges for event hosting. Though surrounding roads can remain open, the limited fifty on-site parking spaces create substantial access issues. The park lacks adequate active transportation resources, with minimal bike infrastructure and distant public transit options. While surrounding streets see less traffic than other venues, a single ADA-accessible entrance and non-compliant sidewalks severely restrict accessibility.

The park's proximity to First West Chester Fire Company and Police Station enhances emergency response capability. Natural lighting and tree canopy support flexible daytime scheduling, but absence of artificial lighting prohibits nighttime events. Additional safety considerations include an on-site creek and pedestrian crossing management.

Residential development surrounds the park, with homes as close as fifty feet. The predominantly older population may be particularly sensitive to noise disturbance. Event hosting requires collaboration with West Chester Borough Parks and Recreation department, Chester County Parks and Recreation, and "Friends of Everhart Park" for community support.

While Everhart Park offers advantages like low traffic and proximity to emergency services, it requires substantial infrastructure improvements before becoming a viable event venue.

West Chester Borough has demonstrated that environmental stewardship and successful events can go hand in hand. The United Nations defines sustainability as "meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs," and Borough events increasingly exemplify this principle through thoughtful planning and execution.

This analysis examines proven sustainability strategies and provides recommendations for future planning based on successful implementations. The goal is to help event organizers integrate environmental responsibility from the earliest planning stages, rather than as an afterthought.

### **CREATING A SUSTAINABILITY FRAMEWORK**

### The Sustainability Team

Every event should establish a dedicated sustainability team responsible for:

- Setting clear environmental goals
- Coordinating with vendors and partners
- Managing waste reduction initiatives
- Educating staff and volunteers
- Monitoring implementation

### **Core Focus Areas**

Successful sustainable events in West Chester typically address:

- Waste management and recycling
- Water conservation
- Energy usage
- Food and beverage practices
- Public education
- Vendor compliance

The following sections detail specific recommendations in each area, drawing from proven success stories within the Borough.

### **WASTE MANAGEMENT**

Effective waste management at Borough events requires a comprehensive approach combining infrastructure, education, and partnerships. Success depends on making proper disposal both easy and intuitive for attendees while ensuring materials reach appropriate processing facilities.

### Infrastructure and Implementation

Event locations throughout West Chester offer different waste management capabilities. Gay Street and Market Street venues provide established trash and recycling stations, while campus events can access additional bins through West Chester University's work order system. Successful events typically feature:

Water management at Borough events requires balancing visitor comfort with resource conservation. Successful implementations have demonstrated that sustainable water practices can enhance rather than detract from event experiences.

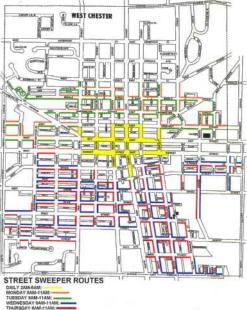

West Chester Borough's journey toward sustainable events reveals that lasting environmental impact grows from understanding. Through events like PorchFest and the Restaurant & Food Truck Festival, organizers have discovered that sustainability initiatives thrive when participants understand not just what to do, but why they're doing it.

Research by Lazar (2023) confirms this approach, showing that sustainable

- Ethical sourcing practices for proteins and dairy
- Plant-based menu options
- Low-impact food preparation methods

### **Packaging and Service**

Proven waste-reduction strategies include:

- Encouraging edible containers (bread bowls, waffle cones,
- Using draft systems for beverages
- Implementing reusable container programs

events create unique opportunities to demonstrate eco-friendly practices to large audiences. The Borough's success stems from integrating education naturally into the event experience, with trained volunteers serving as the cornerstone of these efforts.

### The Eco-Educator Program

The Borough's signature initiative pairs passionate environmental advocates with event attendees at key interaction points. These "Eco-Educators" include:

- WCU Environmental Studies students bringing academic expertise
- Members of Friars and Abbes organizations providing leadership
- National Honor Society members offering peer education
- Representatives from local environmental advocacy groups

Each volunteer receives comprehensive training before events, ensuring they can effectively:

- Guide proper waste sorting at disposal stations
- Answer questions about sustainability practices
- Demonstrate composting and recycling techniques
- Share resources for home implementation

The program's success relies on proper recognition and support. Volunteers receive public acknowledgment during and after events, creating a sustainable cycle of engagement that strengthens community ties while advancing environmental goals.

### **Strategic Communication**

Event messaging builds on this volunteer foundation through multiple channels:

- Entry point signage highlighting zero-waste goals
- Educational displays at waste stations
- Clear recycling and composting guidelines
- Take-home resources for continued learning

As Al-Shihabi et al. (2020) note, this layered approach helps normalize sustainable practices while building lasting community awareness.





**Event-Specific Approaches** The Borough's experience shows that different events require

distinct educational approaches. At the Chester County Restaurant Festival, for example, sustainability education naturally connects with conversations about local food systems and waste reduction. Meanwhile, PorchFest demonstrates how residential events can showcase home-scale environmental practices.

Cultural Events: Through events like the Fall Gallery Walk, sustainability messages weave naturally into discussions of heritage and community values. Artists and cultural organizations often become powerful advocates for environmental stewardship.

Food Festivals: The Restaurant & Food Truck Festival exemplifies how food-centered events can highlight the connection between sustainable practices and local food systems. Vendors share their sourcing stories while Eco-Educators demonstrate proper waste sorting and composting.

Music and Entertainment: Events like World Music Day show how entertainment can subtly incorporate sustainability messages. Artists often become enthusiastic partners in environmental education, reaching audiences through both performance and example.

### **Measuring Impact**

Success metrics include:

- Waste diversion rates at events
- Volunteer participation and retention
- Post-event survey responses
- Social media engagement
- Follow-up program participation

As noted by B. Flamm (personal communication, November 7, 2024), this comprehensive approach helps build lasting community awareness while maintaining the festive atmosphere essential to successful events.

### **VENDOR REGULATIONS**

The success of West Chester's events relies heavily on its vibrant vendor community. Through years of experience, three key institutions have developed complementary regulatory frameworks that ensure both safety and success: West Chester University, the Borough itself, and Chester County Parks.

### **Campus Vending**

West Chester University maintains specific vendor policies that balance campus life with community engagement. Sykes stands as the primary authorized location for outside vendors, offering:

- Established utility connections
- Loading and storage facilities
- Direct access to student foot traffic
- Integrated security services

For events seeking to use other campus locations, organizers must secure approval from both University administration and Borough authorities. This dual oversight ensures proper integration with campus activities while maintaining Borough standards.

### **Borough Requirements**

The Borough's vendor management system reflects lessons learned from diverse events like the Restaurant & Food Truck Festival and Chester County Restaurant Festival. Key requirements include:

- Detailed listing of all participating food vendors
- Current health inspection certification
- Signed waiver and release forms for non-food vendors
- Proof of insurance coverage (\$1,000,000 minimum)

### Chester County Parks Integration

Park events require adherence to the <u>Food</u> <u>Vendor Guidelines and Policies</u>, including:

- Current license from the <u>Chester</u> <u>County Health Department</u>
- Certificate of Insurance (\$1,000,000) naming Chester County as additionally insured
- Completed vendor application
- Compliance with all health department regulations

### **Implementation Strategy**

Successful events typically coordinate these requirements through:

- Early application submissions
- Pre-event vendor orientations
- Clear communication channels
- Coordinated setup and breakdown schedules

The Restaurant & Food Truck Festival demonstrates how these seemingly complex requirements, when properly managed, support rather than hinder vendor participation.

# **Funding and Setup**

### **OVERVIEW**

West Chester's vibrant event scene relies on a sophisticated network of funding sources, from local business sponsorships to state-level grants. Successful events typically combine multiple funding streams while leveraging in-kind support from community partners.

### **FUNDING SOURCES**

### **Corporate Sponsorship Landscape**

The Borough's events benefit from varying levels of corporate engagement (Figure 1), demonstrating both the depth of community support and opportunities for new partnerships:

Single-Event Sponsors:These organizations, ranging from local businesses to regional corporations, form the foundation of event funding. Notable examples include:

## **Sample One Year Timeline**

For Hosting A Special Event in West Chester Borough, PA

### 12 MONTHS OUT

- Set Goals: Clarify objectives of the event including attendee size, revenue estimation, sustainability efforts, and community engagement.
- Do the Research: Identify sources of funding for the event such as available grants and potential sponsors.
- Put Together a Team and Decide on Roles: Form committees for logistics, marketing, public safety, sustainability, transportation, and vendor coordination.
- Conduct a Site Visit
- Secure a Date and Venue for the Event
- Contact Local Stakeholders

- Define the type of alcohol and serving style for the event: Decide on beer, wine, cocktails, or a mix, as well as the serving style for drinks. Options for serving style include cash bar, open bar, drink tickets, etc.
- Identify Licensing Needs for Alcohol: Research Pennsylvania alcohol laws for events as well as West Chester Borough specific regulations regarding alcohol at events.
- Assemble an "Alcohol-Specifics" team: Members of this team should be knowledgeable on managing alcohol, or have experience with events that have included alcohol.

### 11 Months out

- Acquire Permit Applications: Special Event Permit, Special Occasion Permit
- Sponsorship Outreach: Reach out to local businesses and organizations regarding event sponsorships.
- Draft Transportation Plan: Identify parking and traffic measures, road closures, and active transportation opportunities for the event.
- Draft a Budget: Include permit/license fees, insurance,

- alcohol, vendor fees, marketing and sustainability fees. The sample budget provided is a good framework for any event's budget.
- Sustainability Research and Plan: Consult local sustainability experts and plan waste management strategies for the event such as recycling and composting.

### 10 Months out

- Draft a Marketing Plan: Design event branding, sample advertisements, and signage.
- Transportation Plan: Coordinate local shuttle services (SEPTA, WCU), ride-share companies, and Borough officials for parking/road closures.
- Draft Vendor Regulations: Ensure sustainability is incorporated in vendor regulations.
- Reach out to vendors: Engage local vendors by focusing on West Chester based food trucks, breweries, restaurants,

artisans, and performers.

- Apply for Permits: West Chester Borough Special Event Permit
- Begin Permit Applications: Fill out the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board's Special Occasion Permit. The application can be found at <a href="https://www.lcb.pa.gov/Licensing/Topics-of-Interest/Pages/Special-Occasion-Permits.aspx">https://www.lcb.pa.gov/Licensing/Topics-of-Interest/Pages/Special-Occasion-Permits.aspx</a>
- Secure a Licensed Alcohol Vendor

### 9 Months out

- Secure Vendors: Confirm schedules, financials, and regulations with all event vendors.
- Secure Event Funding: Grants, Sponsorships, Fundraisers, etc.
- Develop Emergency Plans: Work with the West Chester Police Department and local Emergency Services to
- plan crowd control, first aid, emergency situations, and intoxication responses.
- Draft Advertisements: Identify a variety of advertisement strategies.
- Coordinate Entertainment and Key Activities for Event

### 8-7 Months out

- Finalize Sustainability Goals: Coordinate with the West Chester Public Works Department to recognize waste management logistics. Reach out to local composting companies regarding special event sustainable waste management.
- Community Engagement: Gather public feedback on the

- Walkthrough of the Venue: Review waste station areas, emergency exits, alcohol locations, and public safety posts.
- Volunteer Recruitment: Reach out to volunteers, assign

### 4 Months out

- Finalize Sustainability Efforts
- Promote the Event Heavily!: Digitally and publically (Social media, local press, partnerships)
- · Transportation Plan Update: Publish maps for event parking, WCU + SEPTA shuttle routes, and bike paths/ racks.
- Host Pre-Event Workshops and Fundraisers (Optional)
- Confirm Public Safety Staffing
- Order Marketing/Advertising Materials: Flyers, banners, signage

### 3 Months out

- Confirm All Necessary Permits are Acquired
- Launch Countdown Campaign/Ticket Sales: Launch a countdown to the event in order to excite the public and begin ticket sales if necessary.
- Finalize Layout: Create a comprehensive site map showing event entrances, waste stations, restrooms, emergency services, alcohol locations, and main activities for the

### 2 Months out

- **Special Event Permit Application Due**
- **Banner Application Due**
- **Notify SEPTA at Least 60 Days Before**

- Community Outreach: Notify residents of street closures, parking, potential noise disturbance.
- Send invitations to local officials, news outlets, and VIPs (if any).

### 1 Month out

- Press Releases: Share previews of vendors, activities, and highlights of sustainability efforts.
- Host Volunteer Training: Host training sessions for

sustainability educators, volunteers, and all other necessary team members.

### **WEEK OF EVENT**

- Send Event Reminder: Send emails to volunteers, vendors. and all other participants.
- Confirm Schedules: Send out schedules to all vendors and volunteers.
- Post a Final Event Checklist
- Advertise: Send out reminders to the public through email, social media, newspaper, etc.

### DAY BEFORE/OF

- Review: Go over safety plans with staff and volunteers. Additionally, conduct a final walkthrough of the event site with Borough officials and confirm vendor locations.
- Set-Up: Signage, venue details, decorations, beer garden/ designated alcohol area, and waste stations
- Test ALL Equipment: Sound, lighting, vendor energy sources, water refill stations, and performers.
- Ensure all public safety officials and emergency management are set up in their designated spots.
- Hold a Team Briefing: Discuss final details with all team members and mention important notes for during the event. Additionally, explain cleanup procedures and hand out specific schedules for vendors, volunteers, and other members of the team.
- Arrive Early: Be sure to arrive early the day of to conduct

final checks on the venue and all other aspects of the event.

Manage Alcohol: Oversee alcohol set up, storage conditions, alcohol consumption, and ID checkers.

### **POST EVENT**

- Waste Management: Ensure waste is collected, streets are cleared, and compost/recycling is disposed of properly.
- Hold a Debrief Meeting: Discuss successes of the event and areas to improve on with members of the team.
- Send Thank Yous via Email: Thank attendees, sponsors, volunteers, and any other participants for their hard work and contribution.

- Share Highlights from the Event on Social Media
- Collect Feedback: Conduct Surveys and Polls to gain knowledge on the event from the Public AND from the Event Team (volunteers, vendors, etc.)
- Submit Final Reports: Alcohol inventory and waste management reports need to be filed if necessary.

## **Important Notes**

- **Grants:** Grant applications have their own timeline. The application deadline, preparation time, and timing of the fund disbursement varies based on the type of grant. Be sure to thoroughly research, plan, and update the sample timeline to include the specifics on certain grants.
- **Alcohol:** Events involving alcohol require additional steps throughout the timeline. If the proposed event includes alcoholic beverages, be sure to follow the extra steps in the timeline that are highlighted blue.
- Morning Drop-Off and Setup for Vendors: Utilize the sample schedule from the 2024 Restaurant Festivalpage 102, provided by the West Chester Parks and Rec Department.

- **Requirements for Outdoor Events:** Abide by West Chester Parks and Recreation Department's requirements.
- Booth spaces shall not exceed 12' X 12' size.
- All appliances and/or equipment requiring the use of extension cords shall use only heavy duty extension cords.
- All gas powered generators shall have self contained fuel tanks.
- All spare propane tanks shall be stored away from cooking appliances and/or open flames and shall have valve caps on
- All extra fuel shall be stored in approved gasoline safety

- rated cans, and shall be stored away from all appliances and the public right-of-way.
- All vendors with any type of cooking appliance, generators, or open flame of any type shall have the minimum of (1) 5 LB ABC DRY CHEMICAL FIRE EXTINGUISHER available at all times.
- There shall be no open flames for decorative purposes within (5) feet of any flammable material.
- All designated public right of ways/walkaways/emergency access points shall be open and unobstructed at all times.
- All booths/displays that must be assembled, shall be properly installed and constructed in a manner so as to prevent accidents, injuries, and or collapse.
- All mobile displays/booths such as concessions trailers shall be placed on level ground, and if the use of generators or propane is required, these items must be properly installed and away from any area that the general public has access to.
- All mobile trailer type displays and or concession trailers shall have (1) 5 LB ABC DRY CHEMICAL FIRE EXTINGUISHER READILY AVAILABLE AT ALL TIMES.
- ALL BOOTHS WILL BE INSPECTED!

### Sample "Morning of Event" Schedule

#### **Restaurant Festival 2024**

#### **Source: West Chester Parks and Rec Department**

**Entry time:** your block captain will greet you and direct you between 8:00am and 10:00am. If you do not arrive on time, your space may no longer be available. We reserve the right to alter your space location if the need arises. All vehicles must be off the street by 10:15am. Timeliness is the key to everything, but also dont arrive too early as that can also cause issues. Arrive within your designated time block, not before... not after.

- You must unload, park your car and return to set up your space
- DO NOT UNLOAD WITH YOUR CAR THERE, If seen you will be asked to park your car immediately. Save your block captains the steps and unload, park your car, and then come back to set up. Your stuff will be watched do not worry.
- Vendors serving from a cart, truck, or trailer, it is suggested that you arrive earlier in your time block to avoid issues entering your space

**Entry Location:** Enter the festival at the intersection of Chestnut St and Church St. Proceed to the intersection of Church St and Gay St. Turn right to enter Block #1. (see map attached)

**How to exit for parking:** Turn right at the intersection of Gay St. and Darlington St. Take Darlington St to the intersection of Darlington St and Chestnut. Turn left onto Chestnut St.

**Parking:** Please see the attached map. There are multiple parking locations within the borough for vendors. There is no parking designated for vendors or within the festival grounds. We recommend parking at lots 10, 6, or 11.

**Re entry:** No cars are permitted on the festival grounds from 11:00am to 6:00pm. Cars are not allowed to re-enter the festival grounds until the police department has cleared all pedestrians and believe it is safe for traffic. Your block captains will inform all vendors when they are allowed to reenter the festival grounds.

**Ice:** food vendors needing ice, may purchase it directly from the ice vendor, located on walnut streed near the post office. Please let them know how many bags you need and where you are located. The ice will be delivered to your location. 40lb bags of ice will cost \$10.00. They accept CASH ONLY.

#### Clean-Up System:

- You must be fully and neatly packed up before you go get your vehicle. We do not want people packing bins while their car blocks traffic (everyone wants to leave... trust me we get it) Also please do not leave any bins or merchandise in the streets, but have them neatly in your spots. We are hoping to reopen the streets to traffic at TIME possibly later possibly sooner, depends on when the police give us the okay. That allows 45 minutes for break down, if you are hoping to leave on the dot and need more time feel free to start breaking down earlier than TIME. Do not leave for your cars until you are told.
- Those who rented, please when breaking down all rental equipment keep it placed inside a parking spot and not
  on the roadway. This makes it hard for the street sweeper to get down. If you leave items unorganized on the
  roadway you may not be able to participate next year.

#### Food Vendor Clean Up:

- Trash Removal: Food Vendors MUST provide (2) 33-gallon trash containers to be placed outside of booth, trash containers for inside of booth, and an adequate supply of 33-gallon trash bags. At the end of the event, if you leave items unorganized on the roadway you may not be able to participate next year.
- Oil Removal: It is the responsibility of the vendor to remove all oils and grease. Vendors MUST NOT dump oil or
  grease on sidewalks, streets, or down street grates. If you are caught dumping oil you will receive a two year ban
  from the festival.
- Charcoal Removal: It is the responsibility of the vendor to remove ALL charcoal from your space. Vendors MUST NOT dump charcoal on sidewalks, streets, or down street grates. If you are caught dumping charcoal you will receive a two year ban from the festival.

No refunds will be issued unless West Chester Parks and Recreation cancels the event.
