In Fall 2024, Dr. Gerardina Martin's HON 311-Stewardship and Civic Engagement Class worked with 9 non-profit partners to complete community engagement activities, such as grant proposal writing, service hours, and visits from Foundation experts who explained the concepts of Social Entrepreneurship and



Philanthropy. Students complete over 1200 hours of service to the community, and they presented to funders and their non-profit partners on December 2nd and 4th. FIFTH ANNUAL DR. CLIFFORD E. DEBAPTISTE FREDERICK DOUGLASS INSTITUTE LECTURE

On Thursday, October 10, Dr. Zachary C. Wooten, Associate Professor of Leadership Studies in the Honors College at West Chester University of Pennsylvania, delivered the interfaith invocation at the Fifth Annual Dr. Clifford E. DeBaptiste Frederick Douglass Institute Lecture. The event, held at 3 p.m., brought together students, faculty, and community members to reflect on themes of justice, equality, and empowerment inspired by the legacy of Frederick Douglass. The lecture series, named in honor of Dr. DeBaptiste, aims to inspire and engage attendees in discussions surrounding the enduring impact of Douglass's work.

YALE UNIVERSITY'S LIFE WORTH LIVING FORUM

Dr. Zachary Wooten, Associate Professor of Leadership Studies in the Honors College, was invited to present at Yale University's Life Worth Living Teaching Forum with his presentation titled "Leadership Education and the Good Life."

The event brought together faculty from around the world interested in the intersection of leadership, ethics, and meaning-making. In his presentation, Dr. Wooten articulated how effective leadership extends beyond traditional metrics of success, advocating for a model that prioritizes the well-being of individuals and communities.

The Life Worth Living Teaching Forum aims to foster dialogue around visions of human flourishing within higher education, making Dr. Wooten's contribution particularly timely and relevant.

Dr. Wooten continues to serve on the project planning team for the Life Worth Living Network at Yale's Center for Faith and Culture. Along with Dr. Matt Pierlott in the Department of Philosophy at WCU, Dr. Wooten leads WCU's Leadership Hub of the Life Worth Living Network. CELEBRATING COLLABORATIVE SCHOLARSHIP: HONORS FACULTY-STUDENT TEAM PUBLISHES ON RABBI REGINA JONAS

We are thrilled to announce the publication of a significant article co-authored by Honors faculty members Zachary C. Wooten, Ph.D., Matthew Pierlott, Ph.D., and Honors alum Elizabeth Gittleson. Their article, "Regina Jonas: A Life of Aspiration and Inspiration," was published in the Journal of Leadership Education in August 2024.

This collaborative work emerged from Dr. Wooten's leadership education lab and his commitment to interfaith leadership initiatives. The article emphasizes the vital role of leadership educators in uncovering stories of remarkable individuals who have been overlooked throughout history. The authors focus on Rabbi Regina Jonas, the first woman ordained as a Rabbi, whose pioneering journey serves as an inspiration for current and future leaders.

In the article, they wrote, "Leadership educators have the responsibility to help students hear the stories of those who may otherwise be forgotten. There is great value to unearthing the stories of those who have been cast aside due to neglect or malice, both historically and in contemporary society. Given the interdisciplinary nature of leadership education, we benefit from a historical lens which helps us to understand who we are and where we come from."

The Wabash Center's Journal on Teaching (JoT) is an annual, multimodal academic periodical with a collaborative peer-review process. This collaborative peer-review process includes the JoT Writing Colloquy and is intended to strengthen writers and writing about teaching and the teaching life. The writing colloquy will be a combination of plenary sessions, small group interactions, individual instruction, and workshopping The colloquy will be led by acclaimed authors with the theme for the colloquy and subsequent issue of JoT being "Spirit." Dr. Wooten and other scholars will explore the profound and varied interpretations of spirituality as they intersect with teaching and the educational experience.


